




Animal Health Law

- ✓ Regulation (EU) 2016/429 on transmissible animal diseases ('Animal Health Law') (AHL)
 - ✓ adopted by the European Parliament and the Council in March 2016
 - ✓ will apply from 21 April 2021
 - ✓ is/will be complemented by additional rules






AHL: one single legal framework for the EU animal health policy

Based on:

- Evaluation of the EU Animal Health policy 1995-2004 (2006)
- AH Strategy "Prevention is better than cure" (2008)
- 2 Impact Assessments (Strategy and AHL)
- Number of consultations

About?

- General principles for transmissible animal diseases in:
 - Kept and wild animals and their products
 - Terrestrial, aquatic and other animals (e.g. reptiles)
- ✓ Animal health rules for:
 - ✓ Disease prevention
 - ✓ Disease surveillance, control and eradication
 - ✓ Intra-EU movements and entry into the EU of animals and products
 - ✓ Emergency measures

Not about?

- ✓ Not in scope:
 - ✓ Animal welfare
 - **✓ EU veterinary expenditure**
 - ✓ Feed, medicated feed
 - ✓ Veterinary medicines (VMP)
 - ✓ Veterinary education
 - ✓ Official controls




Basic rules on disease control measures


- ✓ Articles 53 to 83 of the AHL
- ✓ It provides for basic rules on disease control measures for category A, B and C diseases for terrestrial and aquatic kept and wild animals:
 - Obligations on operators
 - ✓ Investigation by the competent authority
 - **✓ Preliminary disease control measures**
 - ✓ Epidemiological enquiry
 - ✓ Disease confirmation
 - ✓ Disease control measures after confirmation in affected establishments and epidemiologically linked establishments
 - Establishment of restricted zones and measures to apply therein
 - ✓ Emergency vaccination
- ✓ It empowers the Commission to lay down detailed rules.



Commission Delegated Regulation R (EU) 2020/687 as regards rules for the prevention and control of certain listed diseases








All existing disease-specific Directives (FMD, AI, ASF,CSF, 92/119, etc.) and Implementing acts (709/2014, LSD, etc.) will cease to apply by April 2021

Covers kept and wild terrestrial and aquatic animals


Specificities linked to the epidemiology of each disease are provided in Annexes






Content

- ✓ Supplements the rules provided for in Articles 53 to 80 of the AHL
- ✓ It provides for **detailed and disease specific control measures** for **terrestrial and aquatic kept and wild animals** and includes rules on:
 - Measures in the event of a suspicion and confirmation of a <u>category</u>
 A <u>disease</u> (such as FMD) in <u>kept animals</u>
 - Establishment of a restricted zone:
 - ✓ Size, duration and measures to apply in the protection, surveillance and further restricted zones, including reinforced surveillance and restrictions of movements of animals and products
 - ✓ Repopulation/fallowing of affected establishments
 - Measures in the event of a suspicion and confirmation of a category
 A disease in wild animals
 - ✓ Measures for <u>category B and C diseases</u>: reference to R (EU) 2020/689






Establishment of the restricted zone

Conclusions

- ✓ The AHL provides for a unique and harmonised framework as regards the animal health policy in the Union
- ✓ It includes basic rules covering all the aspects related to animal health, including disease control measures
- ✓ The AHL empowers the Commission to develop more detailed rules by way of delegated and implementing acts
- R(EU) 2020/687 provides for detailed disease specific control measures, focusing in category A diseases such as FMD, to rapidly control the spread of such diseases in the Union and to recover the previous animal health status as soon as possible
- ✓ All these new rules are mirroring those current ones which have proven to be effective, which have been updated, complemented and adapted to the new legal framework
