









- The **short/mid-term objective** is to progressively improve the compliance of OIE Member Countries from the region of Europe with OIE Animal Welfare standards and OIE guidance on emergency preparedness.
- continuity with the two previous Action Plans by building upon their achievements
- focuses on strengthening the OIE Member Countries involvement in the development of standards and the regional collaboration towards its implementation
- supported by developed the Result Framework and the Theory of Change

Slaughter of animals 3rd Action Plan

The follow up of the ToT Workshops on slaughter will be ensured with relevant partners through the organisation of two regional seminars.

The seminars will aim to keep up to date the knowledge of the previously trained participants and AW Focal Points, encourage sharing best practices and experience on how to address challenges in OIE standard implementation.

The OIE TAHC Chapter 7.5 is currently under revision.



Slaughter of animals 3rd Action Plan


Proposal:

- Revise and update existing training materials on slaughter of animals and develop online format for the refresher/follow up training
- If possible, with additional elements of the existing material, create a toolbox that the trainers could use for their training (videos, tests, checklists, posters, ...)
- Translate the materials into different languages to be used across the Europe region and beyond (Russians, French and Spanish)

Existing materials OIE and partners materials:

- OIE Improved Animal Welfare Programme
- OIE Regional ToT training materials,
- Education program on animal welfare at the time of slaughter and other types of killing DISA (SCAW)

Next steps - Concept note defining target audience, learning objectives, methodology and IT tool – in collaboration with IZSAM Teramo and SCAW.







Since 2014, **stray dog population control** a priority topic of the WOAH Platform on Animal Welfare for Europe

Within this context, **regional stray dog roadmaps** for **11 Balkans** (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Rep. of North Macedonia, Greece, Kosovo, Montenegro, Romania, Serbia and Turkey) and **8 West Eurasia** (8 Central Asia and Caucasus countries - Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan) **Members**

were launched with the objective to achieve the full compliance with OIE standards on stray dog population control by 2025 for the Balkans and by 2030 for West

Eurasia

In 2019, other 4 Western European (Belarus, Moldova, Russia, Ukraine) Members joined the initiative

Fully in line with the FAO/OIE/WHO "Zero by 30" Global Strategic Plan to end human deaths from dog-mediated rabies by 2030



WOAH Self-Assessment and Monitoring Tool (SAM Tool)

developed in 2015 and reviewed in 2017 with a new section on rabies based on Chapter 8.14


To **facilitate** the implementation of the TAHC Chap.7.7 on stray dog control and **empower** Veterinary Services to do so, the WOAH and the IZS - Teramo/OIE CC jointly prepared a <u>Self-Assessment and Monitoring Tool (SAM Tool 1.0)</u>, under the format of an e-questionnaire:

- ✓ to set a baseline on the national stray dog population situation;
- ✓ to conduct a series of assessments and capacity building activities, with a focus on both the
 welfare of dogs as well as public health aspects, including the rabies dimension;
- ✓ to measure compliance progress overtime;
- ✓ to identify possible gaps in their capacities to implement TAHC Chap.77 measures.

The fourth OIE Regional Workshop on Stray Dog population management (SDB4) initially planned on 2020 and later postponed due to persistent uncertainties related to the COVID-19 pandemic, was held in virtual mode on November the 30th, 2021.

19 participants in representation of 8 WOAH Members - Bosnia & Herzegovina, Croatia, Serbia, Romania, Bulgaria, Republic of North Macedonia, Montenegro, Greece (Albania, Turkey and Kosovo could not attend).

Objective:

To assist countries in achieving full compliance with OIE standard on stray dog population control (and rabies) by 2025, notably on how to progress with tailor made activities according to different Members needs.

Focus:

To gain thorough understanding on the following topics:

- The OIE Platform for Animal Welfare in Europe new Action Plan 2021-2023;
- The OIE **new developments** on Animal Welfare and OIE TAHC Chapter 7.7 revision process;
- The **experience of the Republic of North Macedonia** in the development and implementation of the Veterinary Services National Plan (with a rabies component);
- The Countries' level of adoption of the OIE awareness "Be my hero" campaign;
- The potential role of the **Regional Animal Welfare Centre (RAWC) in assisting the Balkan countries** and what regional expertise is available to support the implementation of the OIE standards on stray dog control.

Next steps

- ✓ To contribute to the development of the SAM Tool 2.0, to be used for conducting the next selfassessment rounds to monitor the Roadmaps progress over time
- ✓ To organize the next self-assessment Rounds -> Workshops
- ✓ To strengthen the Platform's level of technical assistance by setting a pool of 'stray dog managers' in the Balkans and to expand the range of training and capacity building programs aiming at increasing:
- (1) professional skills and capacities of the VSs involved in the <u>development and implementation of the National Action plans and DPMs</u>
- (2) technical know-how of the personnel carrying out carrying out stray dog <u>control activities at Municipal/local level</u>
- ✓ To enhance the opportunities to access to technical assistance projects/financial measures with the support of the Platform Secretariat, the OIE Network of CCs on Animal Welfare, RAWC, other subregional Academic bodies/Institutions and local/international NGOs (2022-2025 WOAH Regional Strategic Action (RSA) on Animal Welfare for Europe)

- The Platform's second action plan (2017-2019) included the welfare of animals in disasters among its priority topics.
- 2. The Platform Secretariat has been tasked with exploring, developing and implementing possible activities in order to enhance WOAH Members' DMRR capacity in Europe, in line with the WOAH Guidelines







A three-year pilot project was launched in 2018 for the Balkan countries (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Greece, Kosovo, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Romania and Serbia), aiming at building a culture of emergency preparedness among Veterinary Services and relevant stakeholders





The first two workshops consisted of discussion-based exercises designed to consider how contingency plans should be structured, which actors should be involved, and what activities and management processes should be implemented

The final workshop has been organized in the form of a **virtual Tabletop Exercise (TTX)** in 2021

The format was identified and developed according to the "WOAH guidelines for simulation exercises"



The TTX aimed at:

- ✓ testing and validating model Veterinary Service's Contingency Plans (VS-CP) for the management of animal welfare matters in a flooding scenario
- ✓ identifying issues and improvements of protocols and operational procedures employed in managing the event


Romanian, Bulgarian and Montenegro representatives updated the participants on project progress achieved over time and introduced their own VS-CP

A fictional flood simulation scenario offered the participants with all the elements pertinent to the management of the imminent threat of a massive flooding and data needed to assess the potential impact of such an event on the local population of domestic and wild animal welfare.



Four working groups - divided in subgroups - were asked:

- ✓ to identify and suggest the main elements
 for improvements of the Rumanian model
 Contingency Plan preparedness, recovery
 and response phases to be applied in
 response to the simulation scenario,
 prepared by the exercise planning team with
 the support of the ANSVSA experts;
- ✓ to discuss how to embed the lessons learned during earlier emergencies when revising operating protocols or developing new ones.





MAIN CONCLUSIONS

- ✓ the importance of strengthening Veterinary Services' awareness on their crucial roles when
 dealing with natural disasters, where they have proven to be responsive and effective
- ✓ the need for a better integration in the Civil Protection mechanisms and for organizing more training events and simulation exercises
- ✓ multi hazard intersectoral contingency planning should aim at strengthening the resilience of local communities and maintaining business continuity while recovering from disasters;
- ✓ all livestock production sectors, including smalls scale farming systems and other animals (zoo) should be considered;
- ✓ contingency planning should be aligned with the need to coordinate crisis management efforts and mitigate the impact of disasters in a One Health perspective
- ✓ interregional cooperation is a key element for success, as well as for the strong participation and support provided by the NGOs and private industry



Next steps

The finalization of the WOAH Platform's triannual pilot project in the Balkans should be seen as a starting point for the widest implementation of the WOAH Guidelines on DMRR in the region

Other events of this kind will follow, but **Veterinary Services should maintain a proactive attitude toward contingency planning** and be prepared where risks for natural disaster are greater and where communities and animals have fewer resources to mitigate, survive, and recover from different types of disasters.

As part of the **ongoing regional needs assessment exercise** focusing on Veterinary Services preparedness and capacity levels, geographical scope and possible disaster scenarios, an "**On-line appreciative enquiry summit on animal welfare in flooding scenarios**" - targeting the triennial pilot project participants - is planned to be held in 2023.

 - Working equids in local country context
 - Veterinary services
 - Para-professional services
 - Health and welfare issues
 - Stakeholder engagement and awareness
 - O aims and objectives of the survey presented at the AW OIE National Focal points meeting (June 2019)
 - O data collection: July-November 2019
 - o participation: 8 countries (ARM, AZE, GEO, KAZ, KGZ, TJK, TKM, UZB)
 - O Initial results were presented at SG13, 21-22 January 2020 in Paris



WELFARE OF WORKING EQUIDS

Awareness campaign

(development, preparatory workshop, deployment, evaluation)

This activity is still under discussion for further development.

Development of an awareness building activates/materailas based on the results of the baseline survey conducted in 2019 - a decision should be taken about further activities that are the most applicable and would have the most impact (e.g. an awareness campaign) to be organized in selected West Eurasian countries to raise public awareness on the economic and welfare importance of working equids.




