

- Brief History:
 - 2008: 76th General Session, World Assembly of Delegates, WOAH/OIE
 - The Assembly re-iterated the importance of the Focal Points for Information on Animal Diseases
 - In addition, requested nomination of other Focal Points as well: (1) Wildlife, (2) Animal disease notification, (3) Aquatic animal diseases, (4) Animal welfare, (5) Animal production food safety, (6) Veterinary products and antimicrobial products, (7) Communication, and (8) Laboratories (added later)
- WOAH National Wildlife Focal Points were created



WOAH Wildlife health programme



The problem

Increased contact between humans, wildlife and livestock and negative impacts on biodiveristy from unsustainbable human activities, such as habitat loss an land-use change, lead to the emergence of diseases which may threaten human and animal health.

Raise awareness and develop advocacy tools



The solution



Promote multisectoral coordination and collaboration

Veterinary Services play an essential role in the prevention of disease emergence (including zoonoses) and in ensuring food security and safety.

A political, policy and scientific environment that allows Veterinary Services to implement effective wildlife health monitoring, surveillance and management is key and will be reinforced by the new OIE Wildlife Health Framework that aims to reinforce One Health strategies to manage the risk of disease emergence and protect wildlife health.

Develop and disseminate scientific knowledge



Protecting wildlife health to achieve One Health

To manage the risk of disease emergence in wil life and transmission of diseases at the human—animal—ecosystem interface.

To protect wildlife health by improving surveillance systems, early detection, notification and management of wildlife diseases.

Strengthen capacity in wildlife health management

- Act as a contact point on matters related to information on wildlife, including wildlife disease:
 - WOAH Preparedness and Resilience Department
 - WOAH World Animal Health Information and Analysis Department
 - Other WOAH Departments
- Receive Reports from the WOAH Headquarters, Regional Offices, and Sub-regional Offices
 - Of the Working Group on Wildlife and other relevant reports (E.g.
 Scientific Commission for Animal Diseases)
 - Related to wildlife or livestock—wildlife interface
 - Conduct the in-country consultation process with relevant experts on draft texts of standards dealing with wildlife health




OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP



- Strengthened sub-regional WHNs and establishment of a regional WHN in Europe.




