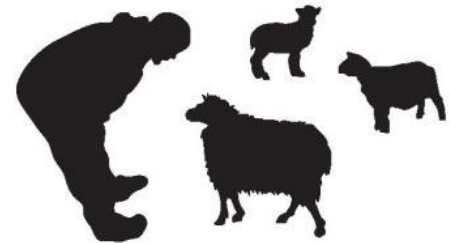

8. TRAINING OF DRIVERS

RESPONSIBILTIES

The welfare of animals during their journey is the joint responsibility of all people involved



RESPONSIBILITIES

Transport companies, vehicle owners and drivers are responsible for:

- planning the journey to ensure the care of the animals (loading plan, journey duration, itinerary and location of resting places)
- loading only those animals which are fit to travel
- the welfare of the animals during the actual transport

RESPONSIBILITIES

- **Animal handlers** are responsible for the humane handling and care of the animals, especially during loading and unloading, and for maintaining a journey log.
- In the absence of a separate animal handler, **the driver is the animal handler.**

Training of driver's Areas of competence

- Understanding national and international legal requirements
- Understanding of all animal transporter responsibilities
- Planning the journey (including planning of journeys with feeding , watering and resting breaks, maximum permissible driving times)
- Contingency planning

Training of driver's Areas of competence

- Suitability of the vehicle and equipment
- Assessment of fitness to travel;
- Animal behaviour, general signs of disease, and indicators of poor animal welfare
- Handling animals in transit (including assembling, loading and unloading)
- Maintaining a journey log and post journey requirements

Training of driver's Practical training

- low stress animal handling
- fitness to travel - assessment
- driving style

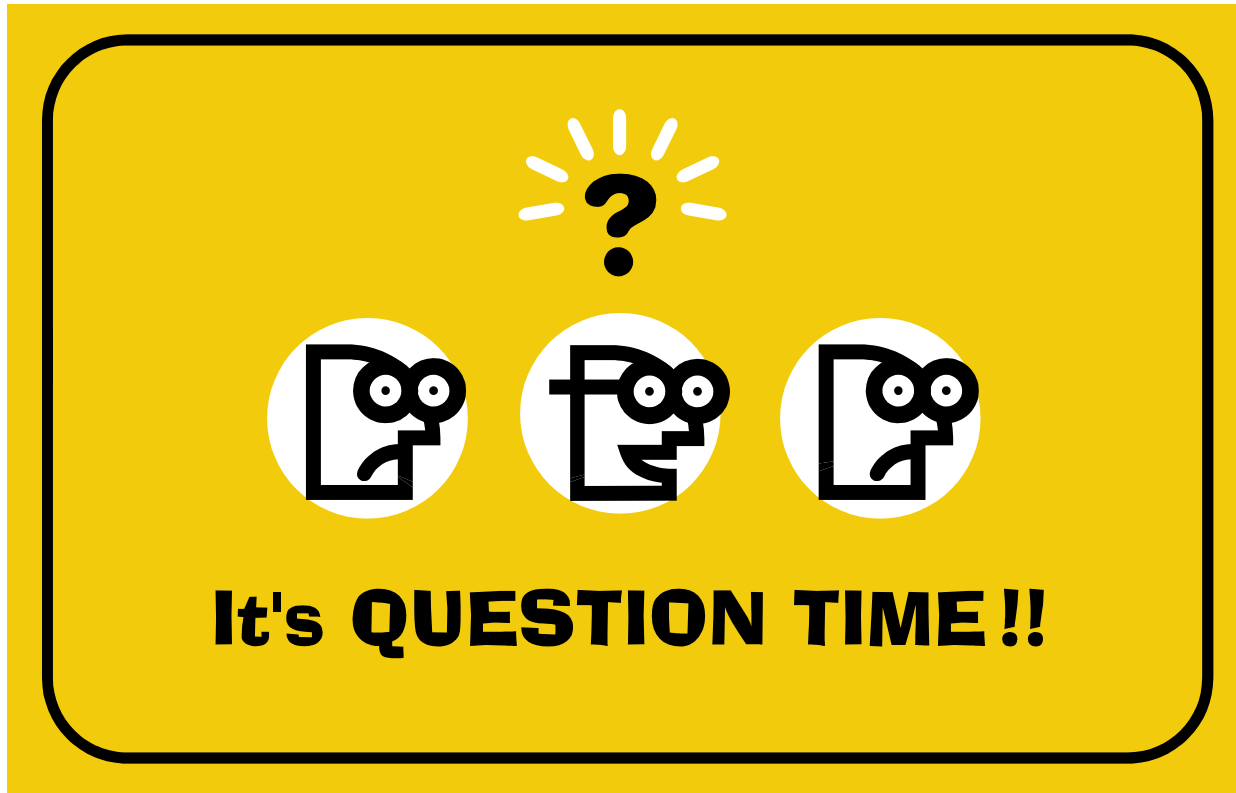
