# Action Plan for 2024-2026

Adopted by the Regional Commission for Europe on 27th May 2024

### Introduction

The World Organisation for Animal Health Regional Platform on Animal Welfare for Europe (WOAH Platform) was created in 2013 to coordinate efforts to improve animal welfare in all 53 countries of Europe and to encourage Veterinary Services to act in compliance with the WOAH standards on animal welfare. Since its launch, the WOAH Platform already successfully implemented three Action Plans for 2014-2016, 2017-2019 and 2021-2023.

The foundations and principles for developing and implementing the proposed 4<sup>th</sup> Action Plan are laid down by Regional Commission for Europe in the Concept Note adopted in 2013 (<u>link</u>) and the Terms of Reference of the Platform adopted in 2020 (<u>link</u>).

The 4th Action Plan – covering 2024-2026 – has been developed by considering the needs identified by WOAH Member countries of the Regional Commission for Europe, the outcomes of and lessons learnt from the implementation of the initiatives taken over the last years, and the results of the external evaluation of the WOAH Platform activities (Annex 1). It will ensure the continuity with the previous ones by building upon their achievements, and by retaining the strategic purpose of empowering Veterinary Services to improve animal welfare across Europe, consistently with the objectives of the 7<sup>th</sup> WOAH Strategic Plan (link) and the WOAH Global Animal Welfare Strategy (link).

## Achievements of the previous Action Plan (2021-2023)

The third Action Plan was implemented over three years 2021 – 2023 with the desired impact to improve animal welfare in Europe through five priority technical topics: transport, slaughter, dog population management, welfare of animals in disasters and working equids. It's adoption, initially expected by WOAH Regional Commission for Europe in May 2020, was later postponed to 2021 due to the global sanitary situation. Nevertheless, most of the planned activities have been carried out successfully and prompted the implementation of relevant additional initiatives taken over time by WOAH partners in Europe, with a clear and increasing focus on sustainability.

### **Transport**

Over the last three years, the Platform continued with activities to support the implementation of the WOAH TACH Chapter 7.2 on the transport of animals by sea and 7.3 on the transport of animals by land. The activities focused the establishing a functioning network of National Contact Points on long-distance transportation for Europe to strengthen communication, collaboration and exchange of information between the competent authorities. Currently, 34 out of 53 WOAH members in Europe formally nominated their National Contact Points for long-distance transportation. The network held two initial meetings in an online format and also had the opportunity for comprehensive discussion at the meeting in Dublin, Ireland, in 2023.

A series of regional and multi-regional whole journey scenarios workshops (WJS) have been organized, giving an opportunity to enhance the understanding of key issues, share best practices and strengthen the inter-regional coordination and cooperation among all actors involved along the specific route(s) of transport within and beyond Europe, up to the Middle East and North Africa.

### Dog population management

To date, eleven Balkan (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Greece, Kosovo\*, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Romania, Serbia, and Turkey), four Eastern Europe (Belarus, Moldova, Russia and Ukraine), and eight West Eurasian (Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan) WOAH Members agreed on a shared vision: to reach full compliance, respectively by 2025 and 2030, with the WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.7 through the implementation of country-specific national roadmaps on dog population management. Although considerable efforts are still needed, the vision remains achievable, in a context where the presence of free-roaming dogs remains a significant issue in some areas and rabies has not been fully eradicated from the region. The Self-Assessment and Monitoring Tool (SAM Tool 1.0) has been highly instrumental to assess the impact of the Platform activities on the advances made throughout the time. This was highlighted in the occasion of the fourth WOAH Regional Workshop on dog population management for the Balkans (SDB4) and during the flash online meeting held in replacement of the 4th workshop to be organized in Western Eurasia. On this occasion, five WOAH Member Countries reported the existence of a National Action Plan for dog population (Greece, Kosovo, Russia, Tajikistan, and Turkmenistan). The individual Country reports developed on the basis the self-assessments conducted with the SAM Tool 1.0 have proven their worth in applying for financial support from international donors. In 2023, a new web-based Self-Assessment and Monitoring platform (SAM4DPM) has been developed in replacement of the SAM Tool 1.0, to help Member Countries to analyse their own date independently by automatizing the self-assessment process and allowing live-time and user-friendly analysis of the information. The Platform has also successfully continued to strengthen the level of technical assistance to the WOAH Members by promoting a closer collaboration between key stakeholders, aiming at increasing the professional skills and capacities of the VSs involved in the development and implementation of the National Action plans and Dog Population Control Programs. Within this context, the RAWC (Regional Animal Welfare Centre) has prioritized public awareness and education initiatives on dog population management and have established a pool of twelve experts on Dog Population Management to strengthen the technical expertise of the personnel carrying out stray dog control activities in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Kosovo\*, Montenegro, North Macedonia and Serbia, in line with the TAHC Chapter 7.7 recommendations.

#### **Disaster management**

The triennial pilot project aiming at assisting the European WOAH Member Countries in promoting a culture of preparedness among Veterinary Services and relevant stakeholders, to ensure appropriate livestock, wildlife and companion animal's assistance in the aftermath of catastrophic events, was concluded in 2021. After three years, nine targeted countries¹ have enhanced their understanding of the operational steps to be planned for preventing and mitigating the impact of natural disasters on animal welfare. A virtual Tabletop simulation exercise closed the pilot and gave the possibility to test and validate model contingency plans, identify key issues and areas for improvement, share and compare protocols, procedures and lessons learned by the Veterinary Services involved in the management of disruptive floods occurred over the time across the Balkans. Other WOAH Members have shown the interest and motivation to support the program's replication in different parts of the region, by using alternative disaster scenarios (Spain, Portugal). A survey on the levels of "Veterinary Services' preparedness for animal welfare emergencies during natural disasters" was also completed. Forty-nine WOAH Europe Members responded with a 92% completion rate. Fifty-two percent indicated they

incorporated animal welfare into their disaster planning whilst the thirty-one percent indicated they had no or limited legal authority to manage animal emergencies during natural disasters. In general, the results show a wide range of capacity to address animal welfare issues and provide the baseline for planning focused and actionable support in the case of catastrophic events. As part of a needs assessment exercise focusing on the level of Veterinary Services' preparedness in the region, the WOAH organized an online Stakeholder Consultation meeting in collaboration with the IZS-Teramo/WOAH CC. The event brought together a group of relevant stakeholders and policy makers, and it offered an additional opportunity to take stock of the Platform progress, share experiences and knowledge, promote new partnerships, agree on key actions to foster a proactive attitude towards contingency planning from the One-Health perspective.

### Slaughter of animals

The 3<sup>rd</sup> action plan had initially foreseen seminars to follow up on training sessions on slaughter conducted from 2015 to 2017 for Eastern Europe and Balkan countries. However, due to the difficulties linked to the organization of physical events and the concurrent revision of the TAHC Chapter 7.5, it has been decided to prioritize the development of an online training package.

The concept note of the online training package has been completed and submitted to the Steering Group and discussed with the Capacity Building Department. The call will be published in early 2024. A dedicated thematic online webinar session on slaughter for the Focal Points on Animal Welfare was carried out in December 2023 focusing on the revision on the standards and presenting the update on development the e-module.

### Working equids

The Steering Group suggested extending the list of targeted countries (initially targeted 8 Caucasus and Central Asia countries and now adding the Balkan region). The Steering Group also proposed to involve in the preparation of the event, the WOAH CC animal welfare (both SLU and IZS Teramo are also partners in the EU reference centre on animal welfare for ruminants and equids) and the Regional Animal Welfare Centre. An online meeting, taking into account the Steering Group recommendations, took place in September 2023, aiming at raising awareness, further identifying WOAH members' needs and discussing how to address WOAH members' needs. This meeting clearly showed the importance of the working equids topic for the participants and helped in establishing a plan of work for the 4<sup>th</sup> action plan (2024-2026). The activities will be focused on helping countries identify their priorities and help them raising their level of implementation of the standards, through workshop and thematic meetings.

### The external evaluation of WOAH Platform

The external evaluation of WOAH Platform was conducted between June — September 2023. The evaluation concluded that the Platform is highly relevant to Members and stakeholders. That is achieved through the Platform's consultative approach. A key strength of the Platform is that the needs of Members were also continually assessed, and the emerging challenges addressed as far as possible during the implementation of activities. This approach has been key in sustaining the relevance of the Platform and likely contributed to the results achieved. However, it would be important to document Members' needs to provide the rationale and justification for the focus and objectives of the fourth Action Plan.

Overall, the governance of the Platform has functioned efficiently, with effective coordination of stakeholder and activities. Most of the planned activities were implemented and in a relatively timely way given the impact of the global COVID-19 pandemic.

An important achievement of the Platform was the creation of a theory of change, a results framework, and monitoring and evaluation (M&E) system. These were well aligned with one another per se, but also had limitations. These limitations may have hindered progress and contributed to challenges – these included measuring progress toward compliance with WOAH standards, the relative contribution of the

Platform's activities to improved compliance, and lack of clarity on the Platform's mandate amongst some stakeholders. It is important that these limitations are addressed.

The findings from the analysis of the theory of change in this evaluation should not detract from the achievements of the third Action Plan. Rather, this analysis highlights tangible and strategic actions that could be implemented to strengthen the effectiveness of the Platform. Having a complete theory of change would provide a vital foundation for the Platform moving forward.

Data from quantitative and qualitative sources illustrate that progress has been made towards achieving the Platform's objectives that go beyond the targets in the current Results Framework. A key task is to update the M&E system in light of the lessons learned from the third Action Plan to provide evidence of the actual changes in compliance with WOAH animal welfare standards and potentially in animal welfare.

One of the most important challenges faced by the Platform has been the inability to provide substantive evidence on progress towards compliance with WOAH animal welfare standards across all of its priority topics. This stemmed from challenges in developing appropriate indicators and tools to measure compliance. However, the development of the self-assessment monitoring (SAM) tool in the dog population management area has provided an important practical solution. The development of SAM tools and other appropriate tools for the other four topics should be a high priority.

An insufficient focus on 'lesson learning' may have limited the Platform's ability to make evidence-based improvements in activities, tools and materials, and to identify best practices. Given its level of expertise the Platform it would be well placed to develop and disseminate evidence-based best practices, especially if there are plans to share these more widely with Members or other regions.

The Platform has now been in existence for nine years but has thus far been unable to answer the question "what difference have the Platform activities made to animal welfare?" Without such information it is also difficult to assess whether any modifications are needed in the Platform's activities. The answer to this question is of interest to donors as well as Members and other stakeholders. It is acknowledged that measuring changes in animal welfare is challenging. However, it is vital for the Platform proactively explore ways to evaluate the impact of their work.

A key strength of the Platform has been its long-term strategy of building on the foundations and achievements and lessons of successive Action Plans. Consolidating on these successes and lessons in the fourth Action Plan would be of benefit.

## Needs express by Members of the Platform

The initial proposal of the 4th Action Plan was shared for consultation with the Regional Commission for Europe, presented and discussed during the dedicated side event at the 90<sup>th</sup> WOAH General Session, and during the 8th Platforms' stakeholders meeting. This confirmed the relevance of previously identified five priority topics: transport of animals, slaughter, dog population management, welfare of animals in disasters and working equids. The specific Members' needs for each priority topic were consulted and collected with participating Members during activities organised within the 3<sup>rd</sup> Action Plan of the Platform and other relevant WOAH events.

The consultation on specific Members' needs concerning the **transport of animals** was mainly conducted through the established WOAH network of National Contact Points on long-distance transportation in Europe. In addition, technical item I (with questionnaire) on long distance transport of live animals from the 30<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Regional Commission for Europe in 2022 provided valuable insight into Members' needs. The Members expressed the need to continue strengthening communication and collaboration between Competent Authorities at regional and multiregional levels, supporting targeted capacity-building activities and developing methods and tools to help with the assessment of the implementation of WOAH standards on transport.

The development of e-learning resources on **the slaughter of animals** was initiated under the 3rd action plan. The SG discussion highlighted a need for activities to support dissemination of e-learning resources materials through online/physical seminars. A thematic online webinar on the slaughter of animals for the National Focal Point on animal welfare is planned for December 2023 to present an

update on the development of an e-module and further consult on specific Member needs for capacity building for this priority topic.

Two regional roadmaps on **dog population management**, with regular biannual workshops and Members self-assessments, established an efficient mechanism to identify the specific needs of involved Members. The Members confirmed the need to support: the development and implementation of National Action plans and dog population management programs, the improvement of the technical expertise of Veterinary Services at the municipal/local level, and the assessment of the level of progress towards the full implementation of the new TAHC Chapter 7.7.

The WOAH Platform, as part of the regional needs assessment on welfare of animals in disasters, conducted a survey on the levels of "Veterinary Services' preparedness for animal welfare emergencies during natural disasters" and held an online stakeholder consultation meeting on "The role of Veterinary Services on animal welfare in natural disasters". The participating WOAH Members confirmed a need to support their activities to develop coordination mechanisms and further build their preparedness, strengthening competencies and improving on multi-hazard emergency management capacities of the Veterinary Services. WOAH support should aim at developing guidance for building contingency plans and be combined with dedicated workshops and simulation exercises. In addition, mapping and prioritizing WOAH Members' competencies and resources at multi-disciplinary level (government bodies, NGO, private, industry, public) will help to identify, prioritize, and harmonize the building of appropriate technical skills.

A baseline survey on the **welfare of working equids**, targeting eight West Eurasian members<sup>2</sup>, was conducted in 2019 to define the needs for working equids' actions. In addition, following the SG recommendation, a regional online event on the welfare of working equids was held on 12<sup>th</sup> September 2023, aiming to raise awareness on the welfare of working equids and to further identify WOAH members' needs and discuss how to address their WOAH members' needs within planned activities. The participants, representing 14 WOAH members from the Caucasus, Central Asia and Balkans, confirmed the need for WOAH to assist members in implementing WOAH standards on the welfare of working equids. The most relevant WOAH actions and activities to support the Competent Authority in the implementation of standards and requirements on the welfare of working equids suggested by participants were to develop training programmes, providing additional guidance through other WOAH documents, facilitate incorporation of the topic into veterinary education, support for dissemination of existing materials and developing awareness raising campaigns tools.

# Objectives of the 4th Action Plan for 2024-2026

#### Impact (Long-term objective):

The desired impact of the 4th Action Plan is to contribute to the improvement of animal welfare in Europe through the following priority topics for the region: transport of animals by land and by sea, slaughter of animals, dog population management, welfare of working equids and welfare of animals during disasters.

#### Outcome Objectives (short/mid-term objective)

The short/mid-term objective is to progressively improve the compliance of WOAH Members from the region of Europe with relevant chapters of the WOAH Terrestrial Animal Health Code and Guidelines on disaster management and risk reduction.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Action Plan, covering the period 2024-2026, ensures the continuity with the three previous Action Plans and it focuses on strengthening the WOAH Members involvement in the development of standards

and the regional collaboration towards its implementation, including through the work of National Focal Points on Animal Welfare.

The WOAH Platform continues to collaborate with all countries and stakeholders involved in animal welfare in Europe who share a common vision and agree in the implementation of activities under the Action Plan. In this regard, efforts are made to prevent duplication of existing activities/programmes on animal welfare in the region and to better organize synergies and resource pooling (EU and NGOs projects, etc).

A comprehensive Result Framework and the Theory of Change used to develop the 3<sup>rd</sup> Action Plan was revised and can be consulted in Annex 1 and Annex 2.

# Scope of the 4<sup>th</sup> Action Plan for 2024-2026

The scope of the Action Plan is as follow:

Continuity on the five priority topics of the previous Action Plans:

- 1. Transport of animals by land (WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.3), with an extension to also cover transport of animals by sea (WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.2)
- 2. Slaughter of animals (WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.5)
- 3. Dog population management (WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.7)
- 4. Welfare of animals in disasters (WOAH Guidelines on disaster management and risk reduction in relation to animal health and welfare and veterinary public health)
- 5. Welfare for Working Equids (WOAH TAHC Chapter 7.12)

### Activities of the 4<sup>th</sup> Action Plan for 2024-2026

The 4<sup>th</sup> Action Plan aims towards the desired impact of through series specific activities on identified priority topics for the region: transport of animals by land and by sea, slaughter of animals, dog population management, welfare of working equids and welfare of animals during disasters.

The regional network of contact points on long distance transportation in Europe was formally established and will continue annual meetings for strengthening collaboration and coordination between countries and sharing information and best practises on live animal transport.

Whole journey scenario workshops involve all countries along long-distance routes, to ensure the knowledge and commitment of the respective Competent Authorities as regards animal welfare from origin to destination. Within the 4<sup>th</sup> action plan two Multi-regional WJS workshop Europe, North Africa and the Middle East are planned to address specific issues, strengthening collaboration and coordination between countries in the context of transport of livestock between Europe, Middle East and North Africa. The selection of specific routes for Europe region will be address within the network of contact points and with dedicated session of NCPT meeting according to the needs.

Development of a self-assessment and monitoring methodology and tool on transport to better understand the current situation of European countries in terms of compliance with WOAH TAHC Chapters 7.2 and 7.3 and allow for measuring progress over time.

Two-yearly workshops have proven being effective for the Platform Secretariat to strengthen the capacity of Veterinary Services in addressing animal welfare and public health aspects of dog population management. The same methodology will be applied for the 2024 - 2026 period.

The new SAM4DPM will enable the WOAH Members to continuously and autonomously monitor and assess the implementation of WOAH standards on dog population management and the progress of their own National Roadmaps.

The outcomes of the pilot project on natural disaster preparedness in the Balkans, the results of the survey on the "Levels of Veterinary Services' preparedness for dealing with animal welfare emergencies during natural disasters" and the conclusions of the online Stakeholders' Consultation meeting on "The role of Veterinary Services on animal welfare in natural disasters in Europe" confirmed a high level of commitment to maintain a proactive attitude towards contingency planning to mitigate the impact on animal welfare and improve the survival and recovery of animals from various kinds of catastrophic events.

Based on the previous experiences, the new activities will allow Veterinary Services to strengthen their multi-hazard emergency management capacities and skills, and to expand the geographical scope of the Platform initiatives on Disaster Management and Risk Reduction with a One Health approach.

Creating synergies and complementarities with all AW partners in Europe is indispensable in a context of limited budget. The format and themes of these consultation meetings will be reviewed annually to best meet expectations.

The theory of change (Annex 2) alongside the results framework (Annex 1) with list of defined indicators for impact, outcomes and outputs establish basis for the overall evaluation of the Platform performance. The external evaluation allows to provide a reasoned and analytical assessment of the initiative as a basis to guide the future development of the Platform to WOAH, current and future donors, and WOAH Platform members and stakeholders.

Further to the development of the Platform self-assessment tool, there is need for other monitoring tools for each specific priority topic to helps to assess impact, results and to define further specific activities for each priority topic
