

Disregarding strong investment case: cost of prevention and preparedness lower than response


One Health

One Health Definition developed by the OHHLEP

"One Health is an integrated, unifying approach that aims to sustainably balance and optimize the health of people, animals and ecosystems.

It recognizes the health of humans, domestic and wild animals, plants, and the wider environment (including ecosystems) are closely linked and interdependent.

The approach mobilizes multiple sectors, disciplines and communities at varying levels of society to work together to foster well-being and tackle threats to health and ecosystems, while addressing the collective need for clean water, energy and air, safe and nutritious food, taking action on climate change, and contributing to sustainable development".





Strategic Priority 3



One Health within the global political agenda

- Enhance further political commitment and investment in One Health through:
- Engagement with political forums such as G20,G7 and UNGA high level meetings to advocate and raise awareness about One Health.
- Advocacy for inclusion of Prevention and One Health in the Pandemic Agreement.
- Support the One Health Group of Friends to organise briefings to member countries on specific One Health issues.
- Enhance One Health governance through:
 - Develop or strengthen One Health coordination mechanisms and regulations.
 - Mapping of existing frameworks, methodologies and tools
 - Developing guidance and tools on transparent One Health governance and regulatory frameworks.

Strategic Priority 4



Leveraging investments &

Coordination Functions

- Leveraging investments for the OH JPA implementation through channels of funding and finance
- Strengthening core support to the **Coordination Functions**, including through sustained funding, to ensure the sound delivery of the priorities



Take Home Messages

The One Health approach is essential to prevent pandemics, ensuring food safety, reducing AMR and addressing environmental issues and the triple planetary crisis, ensuring no country is left behind

Implementing a One Health approach generates co-benefits for all stakeholders

Each sector has a role to play in this effort and their role is essential to achieve success
