# Cooperation at CVO level: Baltic Council of CVOs





- Established long ago
- Initially for three Baltic countries LV, LT and EE
- Poland was invited to join in 2013 (due to ASF risk)
- Annual meetings (2-3 days) of the teams of CVOs
- Discussions on actual topics and hot issues
- Exchange of experiences, best practices
- Intention to reach common agreements / position
- Formal work in the informal environment

#### What have we achieved?

- Better contacts between Veterinary authorities of the countries and friendship
- Several agreements on «regional» approach / solutions for specific situations
- More «weight» at the EU level higher chance to initiate and achieve changes in EU legislation and guidelines
- Agreements on future strategies
- Strengthening the region

# Baltic cooperation: expert level

- Sustainability of expertise no frequent changes of staff
- Regular contacts phone calls, Whats app, Viber
- Quick solutions of sudden issues
- Quick information / contacts provided
- Quick advice
- Quick coordination of position / opinion



# Baltic cooperation: expert level (2)

- Cross-border simulation exercises (CSF, FMD)
- Practical expertise / help in case of outbreaks:
  - Two LV culling experts went to LT to help with culling of pigs in large pig farm affected by CSF
  - EE provided training to LV on mass killing of pigs using CO<sub>2</sub>







# Cooperation within Nordic-Baltic region





Cooperation between competent veterinary authorities in the Nordic and Baltic countries – expert level



#### **Countries in the group:**

Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Iceland, Greenland and the Faroe Islands

Baltic states joined this group in 2006





The Nordic Council of Ministers and the Nordic Council

Nordic Council of Ministers for Fisheries, Aquaculture, Agriculture, Food and Forestry (MR-FJLS)

Nordic Working Group for Microbiology & Animal Health and Welfare (NMDD)

The remit of the working group covers activities in the fields of microbiology, animal health and welfare, and to ensure that Nordic agencies work together effectively.

The Nordic-Baltic Veterinary Contingency Group (N-B VCG) is an ongoing NMDD project since 2006







### The objectives:

- to improve cooperation, communication and exchange of information and experiences between the veterinary authorities within the Nordic-Baltic region, in the context of contingency planning and during animal diseases crises;
- to increase awareness among professionals and stakeholders within the region regarding animal health threats and emerging disease.



## The activities of the group:

- 2-3 meetings per year (at least one face to face)
- One international seminar every two years
- One simulation exercise every 2-3 years
- Workshops / training of group members + few more experts from countries





### **Examples of group activities:**

- **International seminars** on risk analysis, vector borne diseases, risk-based surveillance and contingency planning, infectious diseases of wildlife, biosecurity.
- International simulation exercises: FMD, Bluetongue, West Nile fever, African swine fever and viral hemorrhagic septicemia.
- Workshops and trainings on: Preparation of simulation exercises, animal expert groups, rapid qualitative risk assessments for use in National veterinary administrations and communication.





#### Memorandum of Understanding



The Nordic-Baltic Animal Health Emergency Reserve

**Nordic-Baltic Veterinary Contingency Planning Studies** 

- a Nordic Animal Health Emergency Reserve, to provide support and assistance to a participant in response to an animal disease outbreak emergency; where the resources of the country affected by the outbreak are not sufficient to meet the needs of the country affected by the outbreak emergency.
- a platform for Nordic-Baltic Veterinary Contingency Planning Studies, to support study visits and training sessions facilitating enhanced animal disease preparedness in the Nordic-Baltic Region.
