



WOAH is recognised by the WTO SPS Agreement as the standard setting organisation for animal health and zoonoses.





Terrestrial Code - Volume II: <u>Disease-specific chapters</u> (Section 8 - 15)

<u>In principle</u>, each chapter has provisions on:

- Definition of infection/infestation and specific epidemiological considerations (e.g. hosts, incubation, ...)
- Safe commodities
 - Safe commodities = (Ch. 2.2.) <u>based on absence of the pathogenic agent in the traded commodity</u> OR <u>inactivation by the standard processing or treatment that the commodity has undergone,</u> not specifically targeting the pathogenic agent concerned
 - Importing countries should not apply trade restrictions to safe commodities with respect to the pathogenic agent concerned
- Determination of the animal health status of a country, zone or compartment, or of a herd, of origin
- Recommendations for safe trade for live animals, germinal products, other products of animal origin (meat, milk, eggs, skins, etc.)
- Specific management of commodities, e.g. recommendations on inactivation of the pathogenic agent concerned
- Recommendations on surveillance, e.g. strategies specific to infection/infestation

Specific provisions are presented in articles within a chapter



Harmonisation

- WOAH Standards are based on scientific principles and scientific evidence
- Provide recommendations applicable to all Members for countries to develop their sanitary measures for animal health and zoonosis

Scientific risk assessment

WOAH Standards include specific recommendations on how to conduct Import risk analysis (Chapters 2.1 of Terrestrial and aquatic Code)

Regionalisation

- WOAH Standards provide specific recommendations for different animal health status at origin, considering country level, zones, or compartments.
- There are specific WOAH Standards for Members to define the animal health status at origin, including to define disease prevalence (Standards on surveillance), to define subpolutations (zones, compartment, herd) and standards on national official control programmes.

Equivalence

- WOAH Standards are outcome based
- WOAH Standards provide alternative measures that provide a similar level of safety

Non-discrimination

WOAH Standards are outcome based and applicable to all Members

Transparency

 WOAH Standards include specific notification obligations for Members to communicate the disease situation to the international community.







Chapter 3.3. Evaluation of Veterinary Services

Objectives of the evaluation of Veterinary Services

- 1. The evaluation of Veterinary Services has the following objectives:
- 2. to provide an independent, objective perspective on the performance of Veterinary Services;
- 3. to verify performance, provide confidence, enhance reputation and avoid complacency, and as part of a process of continuous improvement;
- 4. to demonstrate compliance of the Veterinary Services with Chapter 3.2.;
- 5. to better advocate for, allocate and prioritise resources;
- 6. to generate trust between trading partners in the quality and integrity of Veterinary Services.



Who evaluates?

- 1. The evaluation of Veterinary Services can be performed by the country itself (self-evaluation),
- 2. by another country or countries, or
- 3. by WOAH experts under the auspices of WOAH as part of the PVS Pathway.


National official assurance systems


