Current Outputs on Equine Welfare



Reviews:

- Welfare of working equids
- Confinement & restriction of movement & social contact
- Enrichment (environmental, relational, sensory, physical & occupational)

Factsheets:

- Confinement in domestic horses
- Environmental enrichment
- Fitness for transport





Current Outputs on Equine Welfare

Q2E:

- Social contact & freedom of movement
- Fasting intervals
- Small trailers for horse transport

Training Toolkits:

- Environmental enrichment for ruminants & equines









Definition of 'Working Equids'

'A working equid is defined as an equid that performs physical activity in service of the person(s) who owns, keeps or hires them. Working equids may be used in production (e.g. in agriculture, for carrying or pulling loads and transporting of firewood and other supplies, horse skidding), leisure (e.g. in tourism industry for transporting people, riding schools) and sport activities (e.g. performing riding exercises, competitions, races, equine assisted therapies)'.







Recommendations from the Review on Working Equids

Access to feed and water

Diet is balanced and tailored according to age, workload and body condition

Sport horses are offered small quantities of feed 2-3 h before intensive exercise

Clean, fresh water ad libitum

Access to shelter and resting areas

At temperature < 4°C, extra bedding, blankets or shelter should be provided

Protection from heat and cold stress

Thermoneutral zone: 5 - 25°C

No horse events when temperature > 30°C

When temperature > 35°C, working hours between 13.00-17.00 should be avoided.







Recommendations from the Review on Working Equids

Behavioural needs

Social contact Companionship Free movement Access to shelter and roughage

Preventive health care

Daily hoof checks
Parasite control based on faecal egg counts
Vaccination protocols
Annual dental checks
Analgesia during painful husbandry procedures







Recommendations from the Review on Working Equids

Workload

Restrictions: under 3 years of age, 3 months before foaling Horses carry less than 20% and donkeys carry less than 30% of their body weight

Equids work a maximum of 6 h/d with a minimum 30 min break in the middle and are given 2 d of rest per week

Equipment

Equipment is checked every 3-6 months for wear and tear and adjusted or replaced

Personnel

Clear communication, positive reinforcement and the gradual development of skills

Professional workers are continuously trained to stay informed about equine welfare and best practices







Future Activities on Equine Welfare
