Background: WOAH National Wildlife Focal Points

History

- 2008: 76th General Session, WOAH World Assembly of Delegates
 - The Assembly re-iterated the importance of the Focal Points for Information on Animal Diseases
 - In addition, requested nomination of other Focal Points: Wildlife, Aquatic animal diseases, Animal welfare, Animal production food safety, Veterinary products and antimicrobial products, Communication, and Laboratories (added later)

Governance

Focal points are nominated by and are under the authority of the Delegate even when they
are located in other Ministries or Departments

Function

- Focal points serve primarily as a means for improved communication between Members and WOAH
- FP establish networks and improved communications at country level between two or more Competent Authorities.



The WOAH National Wildlife Focal Points (WFP) are part of the bigger WOAH Wildlife Programme launched in 2020



WFP Terms of Reference (TORs)







NETWORKING

with relevant / wildlife experts
within their country

COOPERATION and COMMUNICATION

with relevant national authorities where responsibilities are shared

To establish a Network of wildlife Experts

- Or link with existing national network
- Facilitate the circulation of the information through these networks

To establish and maintain a dialogue

- With the competent authority for wildlife in his/her country
- And faciltate cooperation among several autorities in charge of wildlife





CONTACT POINT for WOAH Relevant Departments to provide and receive information on wildlife health

IN-COUNTRY CONSULTATION PROCESS

with expert network on proposed draft standards

- Act as a contact point on matters related to information on wildlife, including wildlife disease
 - WOAH Preparedness and Resilience Department
 - WOAH World Animal Health Information and Analysis Department
 - Other WOAH Departments
- Receive Reports from the WOAH Headquarters, Regional Offices, and Sub-regional Offices
 - Of the Working Group on Wildlife and other relevant reports (E.g. Scientific Commission for Animal Diseases)
 - Related to wildlife or livestock—wildlife interface
 - Conduct the in-country consultation process with relevant experts on draft texts of standards dealing with wildlife health





COMMENTS on meeting reports and proposals for new WOAH Standards and Guidelines for the National Delegate

COLLECTION AND REPORTING

of wildlife disease information through the WOAH-WAHIS system and the upcoming Wildlife Disease Reporting System

To prepare comments for the WOAH Delegate

- on relevant meeting reports
- on the proposals for new WOAH standards and guidelines related to wildlife
- reflecting the scientific view and position of the individual WOAH Member and/or the Region

To collect and report wildlife disease

- under the authority of the WOAH Delegate of his/her country
- through WAHIS (immediate notifications and followup reports, six-monthly reports, and annual questionnaires) and WAHIS-Wild beta
