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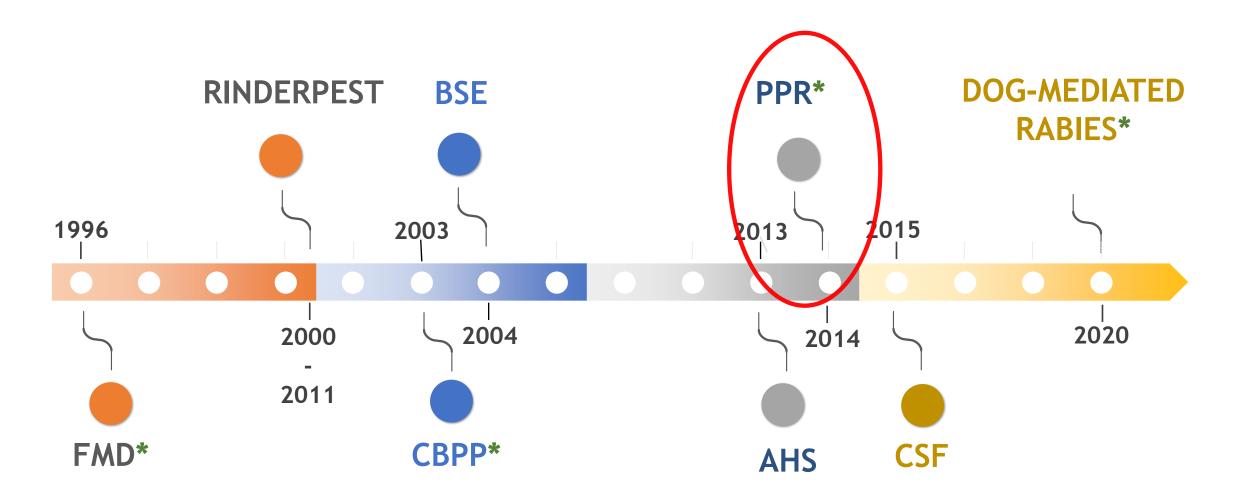

Official recognition of animal health status

The official recognition of animal health status of Members is of great significance for international trade and constitutes one of the most important legal links between WOAH and World Trade Organization (WTO).

Benefits of official recognition of animal health status include:



Demonstrate compliance with WOAH International standards



Protect animal and human health in international trade



Facilitate safe trade of animals and their products



Demonstration of the quality of Veterinary Services.

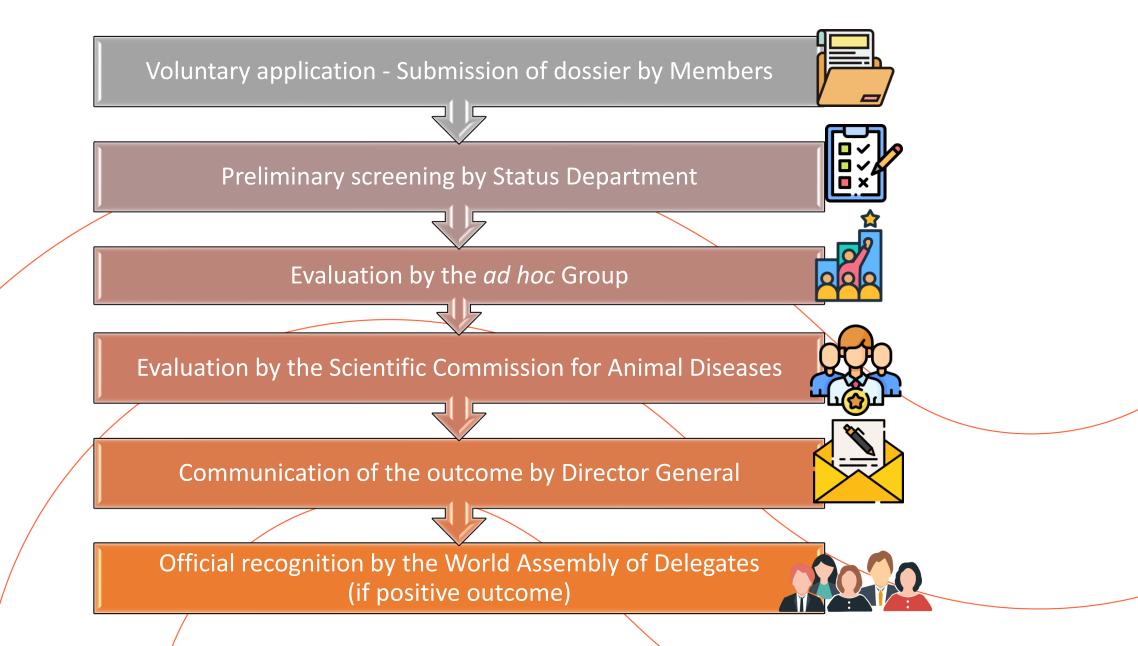

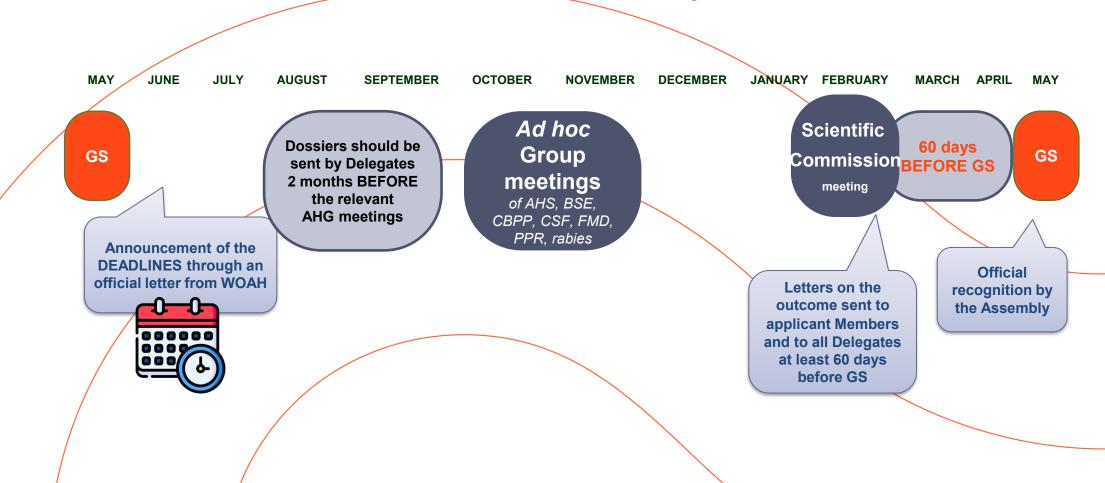




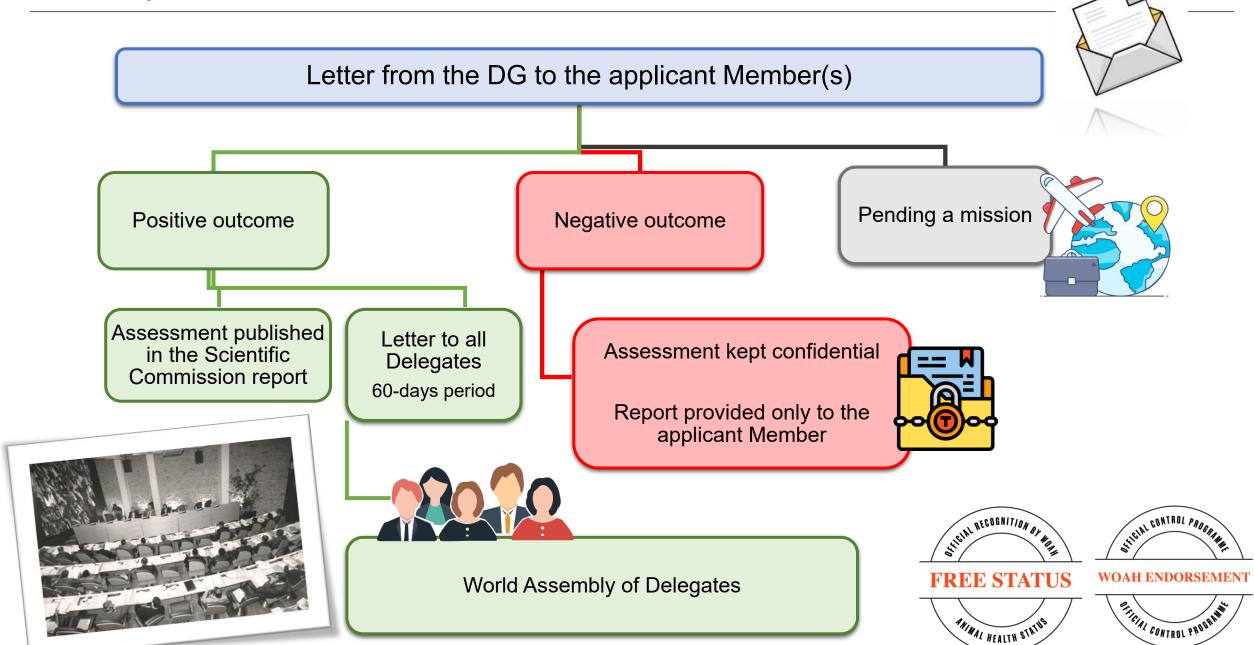
The procedure: Submission of an application

- Deadline to submit dossier: 2 months before the meeting of the AHG



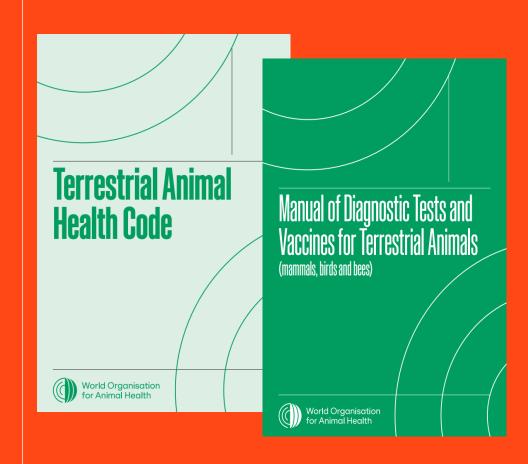

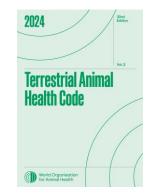

Case definition

Infection of sheep and goats with PPR-virus is defined as...

- 1. Isolation of PPR-virus (excl. vaccine strains)
- 2. Detection of antigen or RNA (excl. vaccine strains)
- 3. Detection of antibodies to PPR-virus (excl. those resulting from vaccine strains)







Article 14.7.1.: General provisions

Infection of sheep and goats with PPR-virus is defined as...

Clinical signs or epidemiological link

- 1. Isolation of PPR-virus (excl. vaccine strains)
- 2. Detection of antigen or RNA (excl. vaccine strains)
- 3. Detection of antibodies to PPR-virus



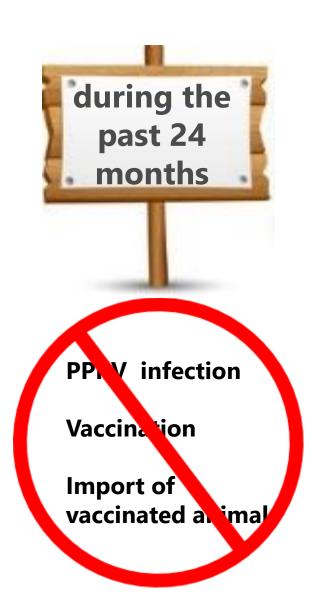


Terrestrial Code for official PPR-free status

Article 14.7.3. "The freedom article"

A country or zone may be considered free from PPR when at least for the past 24 months:

- No case of infection with PPRV
- Veterinary authority has current knowledge and authority over all domestic sheep and goats
- Surveillance has been implemented in accordance with:
 - > Article 1.4.6. if historical freedom
 - > Articles 14.7.27. to 14.7.33. if not historical freedom
- Measures to prevent the introduction of the infection have been in place (importations or movements)
- No vaccination against PPR has been carried out
- No animals vaccinated against PPR have been introduced since the cessation of vaccination





Terrestrial Code for official PPR-free status

Article 1.4.6. point 2b "Historical freedom"

A country or zone may be considered free without formally applying a pathogen-specific surveillance programme when:

- For at least the past 25 years there has been no occurrence of infection
- For at least the past **10 years**:
 - ✓ No vaccination against the disease has been carried out
 - ✓ The prerequisites in 1.4.6. point a) are met:
 - The infection has been a notifiable disease
 - An early warning system has been in place
 - Measures to prevent the introduction of the infection have been in place (importations and movement control)
 - > The infection is not known to be established in wildlife



Article 14.7.8. to 14.7.25: Recommendations for import of commodities

Article 14.7.28-30: Surveillance

A PPR surveillance programme should include:

- ✓ Early warning system for rapid reporting and investigation of suspected PPR
- ✓ Where a population of a susceptible <u>wildlife</u> species may act as sentinels indicating the spill over of PPRV from domestic sheep and goats, <u>serosurveillance</u> data should be collected (purposive and opportunistic samplings)



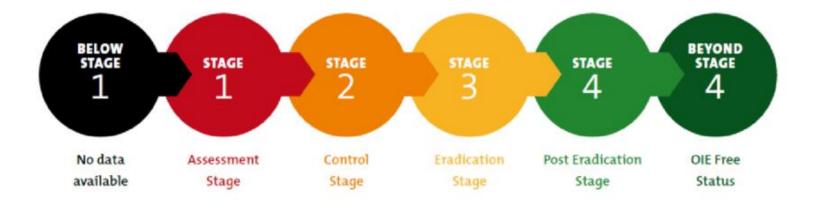
Article 14.7.28-30: Surveillance

A PPR surveillance programme should include:

- ✓ When relevant regular and frequent <u>clinical inspection</u> and <u>serological</u> <u>testing</u> of high-risk groups
- ✓ Clinical surveillance detects clinical signs of disease
- ✓ Serological surveillance cornerstone of surveillance
- ✓ Article 14.7.31. Additional surveillance requirements for Member Countries applying for WOAH endorsement of official PPR-free status



- Any Member may, on a **voluntary basis**, apply for endorsement of its official control programme for PPR
- Objective for Members is to progressively control and eradicate PPR in their territories and eventually attain official recognition of PPR-free status by WOAH
- Control programme should be applicable to the entire territory even if implemented on a zonal basis
- Stage 3 of the PPR stepwise approach
- Measures listed in Article 14.7.34. ("WOAH endorsed official control programme for PPR") should already have been implemented when the official control programme is presented for adoption, and results of their effectiveness should be presented





The Questionnaire (Chapter 1.12)

Article 1.12.3.

Application for endorsement by WOAH of an official control programme for peste des petits ruminants

The following information should be provided by WOAH Member Countries to support applications for endorsement by WOAH of an official control programme for peste despetits ruminants (PPR) in accordance with Chapter 14.7. of the Terrestrial Code.

The dossier provided to WOAH should address concisely all the topics under the headings provided in Sections 1 to 4 to describe the actual situation in the country and the procedures currently applied, explaining how these comply with the Terrestrial Code.

In Sections 3 f) to 3 i) describe concisely the work plan and timelines of the control programme for the next five years.

The terminology defined in the WOAH Terrestrial Code and Terrestrial Manual should be referred to and used in compiling the dossier.

National legislation, regulations and Veterinary Authority directives may be referred to and annexed as appropriate in one of the WOAH official languages. Weblinks to supporting documents in one of the official languages of WOAH may also be provided, where they exist.

All annexes should be provided in one of the WOAH official languages.

The Delegate of the Member Country applying for endorsement of the official control programme should submit documentary evidence that the provisions of Article 14.7.34, have been properly implemented and supervised. In addition, the Delegate of the Member Country must submit the detailed national official control programme for PPR.

Introduction

- a. Geographical features (rivers, mountain ranges, etc.). Provide a general description of the country and zones, and where relevant of the region, including physical, geographical and other factors that are relevant to introduction of infection and spread of PPR virus, taking into account the countries or zones sharing common borders and other epidemiologic pathways for the potential introduction of infection. Provide maps identifying the features above. Specify whether the application includes any noncontiguous territories.
- b. If the endorsed plan is implemented in stages to specific parts of the country, the boundaries of the zones should be clearly defined, including the protection zones if applied. Provide a digitalised, geo-referenced map with a description of the geographical boundaries of the zones.
- c. Livestock demographics. Describe the composition of the livestock industry in the country and any zones. In particular, describe:
- i. the susceptible animal population by species and types of production systems;
- ii. the number of herds or flocks, etc. of each susceptible species
- iii their geographical distribution



Role of the questionnaire



- ✓ To assist Members
- ✓ To assist experts
- ✓ To give more transparency and consistency to the evaluation process
- ✓ To standardise the evaluation among countries

Examples of common shortcomings

2. Veterinary services

- Concise summary of legislation relevant for PPR, with crossreference to annexes
- Clear description of the capability of Veterinary Services as well as consideration of PVS findings (if any
- Lack of specific info on PPR awareness on the part of farmers, veterinarians and other stakeholders
- Lack of description on identification system, registration, traceability and movement control

3b. PPR Surveillance

- Lack of information on early detection systems and follow-up of PPR suspected cases
- Lack of detail on surveillance design incl. follow-up of positives
- Absence of detailed summary table for at least the last 24 months – suspected, sampled (sample type), tested and testing methods, results (by species)

d. PPR diagnostics

- Clarity on the relationship and level of oversight between National Ref Lab and other labs
- Participation in proficiency testing including results
- Clear statement on the relationship with a WOAH Reference Laboratory

d. Strategies

- Protocol of the vaccination programme
- Description of vaccine used and compliance with the WOAH Terrestrial Manual
- Post-vaccination monitoring

4. Control measures and emergency response

- Absence of a contingency plan specific for PPR
- Lack of a description on the structure of compensation



Take home message

When submitting a dossier for official PPR-free status and endorsement of PPR control programme...

- Respond in full to all questions of the questionnaire and any subsequent questions raised by WOAH and the ad hoc Group experts
- Acknowledge gaps and describe how they are being addressed
- Provide documented evidence whenever possible
- Describe in detail using clear, understandable language put yourself in the expert's shoes!
- Use WOAH terminology and refer to WOAH Standards (Terrestrial Code and Terrestrial Manual)

How can I show in my dossier that we follow the requirements of the Terrestrial Animal Health Code?





Maintenance of already granted status/endorsed control programme

(Annual reconfirmation)



- Countries with granted official status and endorsed control programme should participate in annual reconfirmation
- Nov-Dec every year
- Online platform
- Respond to questions and provide documented evidence when prompted
- Status/endorsement can be revoked if uncompliance is detected
- Communicated to the Member Delegate by the WOAH Director General
